



Pentecost Sunday

The Coming of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:1-11)
 When the day of Pentecost came, all the believers were gathered together in one place. Suddenly there was a noise from the sky which sounded like a strong wind blowing, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. Then they saw what looked like tongues of fire which spread out and touched each person there. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to talk in other languages, as the Spirit enabled them to speak.

There were Jews living in Jerusalem, religious people who had come from every country in the world. When they heard this noise, a large crowd gathered. They were all excited, because all of them heard the believers talking in their own languages. In amazement and wonder they exclaimed, "These people who are talking like this are Galileans! How is it, then, that all of us hear them speaking in our own native languages? We are from Parthia, Media, and Elam; from Mesopotamia, Judea, and Cappadocia; from Pontus and Asia, from Phrygia and Pamphylia, from Egypt and the regions of Libya near

Cyrene. Some of us are from Rome, both Jews and Gentiles converted to Judaism, and some of us are from Crete and Arabia—yet all of us hear them speaking in our own languages about the great things that God has done!"



The great feast of Pentecost celebrates the birth of the Christian church. After Jesus' death and resurrection, Jesus' followers were afraid and alone – hiding from the Jews and meeting in secret. After the Holy Spirit came and filled them they changed and went out to the crowds and spoke bravely and with courage about all that Jesus had taught them. The same Holy Spirit continues to be alive in our church and fills us with the grace of God. The disciples had the courage to speak the truth about the Risen Lord - do we have the same courage to speak out in our world and at times be counter cultural?

Tongues of fire, flames of fire, lives set ablaze on the first Pentecost Sunday – and lives set ablaze to the end of time, while there are people open to the fire of the Holy Spirit, the "living Spirit...who resurrects and awakens everything that is..." (St. Hildegard of Bingen).

This time of year is full of rich feast days and celebrations within our church.

Trinity Sunday- 27th May

This marks the end of the many weeks which were taken up with the celebration of and reflection on the 'Paschal Mystery'. It began with Ash Wednesday, went through Lent, the celebration of Holy Week and Easter, the weeks following Easter and culminating in Pentecost and the handing on of Jesus' mission to his Church.

Traditionally the transition into ordinary time is commemorated each year by our celebration of the Feast of the Holy Trinity.

The doctrine of the Trinity is one of the most fundamental in our Christian faith but it is also a doctrine which many of us have difficulty coming to terms with. We often refer to it as a 'mystery' and therefore something which can be affirmed but is not to be understood and need not be explained. "Just believe it," is something people may be told. I always think about the Trinity in terms of water (God- life giving), ice (Jesus- changed in appearance, yet still water) and steam (Holy Spirit- changed in appearance again, and not always visible to us except through signs like the appearance

of condensation). These three states of existence are all present but they are the same substance- water.

The Body and Blood of Christ Sunday- 3rd June

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is also known as the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, which translates from Latin to "Body of Christ." This feast is celebrated on the Thursday following Trinity Sunday or, as in Australia, on the Sunday following that feast.

This feast calls us to focus on two manifestations of the Body of Christ: the Holy Eucharist and the Church. The primary purpose of this feast is to focus our attention on the Eucharist. The opening prayer at Mass calls our attention to Jesus' suffering and death and our worship of Him, especially in the Eucharist.

At every Mass our attention is called to the Eucharist and the Real Presence of Christ in it. The secondary focus of this feast is upon the Body of Christ as it is

present in the Church. The Church is called the Body of Christ because of the intimate communion which Jesus shares with his disciples. He expresses this in the gospels by using the metaphor of a body in which He is the head. This image helps keep in focus both the unity and the diversity of the Church.

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Our Lady Help of Christians - 24th May

In 1815, the feast and special title were introduced by Pope Pius VII in thanksgiving for being liberated by Napoleon. It is also a special day of significance in Australia, because in 1844 the bishops nominated Mary as a special patron of our country under this title.

The infant church in Australia had a special reason for turning to Mary. No priests were sent to the colony in its early days and Mass was not allowed except for one brief year until 1820. It was largely the Rosary in those early days that kept the faith alive.

Catholic Australia remained faithful to Mary and was the first nation to choose her under the title Help of Christians, as principal Patroness.

National Sorry Day



“We apologise for the laws and policies of successive Parliaments and governments that have inflicted profound grief, suffering and loss on these our fellow Australians...For the pain, suffering and hurt of these Stolen Generations, their descendants and for their families left behind, we say sorry.” Prime Minister Kevin Rudd, 13 February 2008

On our pathway towards reconciliation, Sorry Day on 26th May is an important moment to remember the past policies of forced child removal. Here, we reflect on the sad and painful history of the Stolen Generations and recognise moments of

resilience, healing and the power of saying Sorry.

Did you know?

- The first Sorry Day was held on 26th May 1998— exactly one year after the Bringing Them Home Report was presented to the Parliament.
- The Bringing Them Home Report was the result of an inquiry into the removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families, and recommends both an apology to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and reparations.
- The term “Stolen Generations” refers to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians who were forcibly removed, as children, from their families by government, welfare or church authorities and placed into institutional care or with non-Indigenous foster families.
- The forced removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children began as early as the mid-1800s and continued until the 1970s.
- Tasmania is the only state that has introduced a reparation scheme specifically for members of the Stolen Generations.

School Attendance

In the Gonski 2.0 Report that was published recently one of the 3 priorities that were expressed in the recommendations for schooling in Australia was to **Deliver at least one years growth in learning for every student every year.**

In order to support this priority, as a school community, we can start with all our students being present at school everyday.

After analysing our attendance data for Term 1, this is an area for us all to work on. While we have a number of students across the school who had 100% attendance for Term 1,

congratulations to those students, 88.9% of students had some form of absence, which in turn impacts their learning.

We all need to remember that **ATTENDANCE = ACHIEVEMENT**
Research has shown that:

There is a direct link between attendance and achievement in all areas. Poor attendance is cumulative and has long term impacts. Decline in attendance often leads to early school exit, which is then linked to decreased life expectancy.

Attendance matters-Studies show that children who miss too many days in Kindergarten and Year One can struggle academically in later years, particularly if they miss 10% of school days. This can be just two days a month and can build up before you know it.

How can you help:

- *set regular bedtime and morning routines
- *plan family holidays during school holidays
- *schedule your child's medical and dental appointments before or after school
- *make sure your child/children come to school everyday unless they are truly unwell
- * have a backup plan for getting your child/children to school e.g. car pool

Make sure your child arrives at school before the bell at 8:55 and completes each day of learning, i.e. until the 3:15 bell in the afternoon.

As a school we are striving to improve whole school attendance with the support of the whole community: students, parents/carers and staff.
